PLEASE READ RULES FOR YOUR EXHIBITS, SOME HAVE CHANGED

RULES

1. See West Hall Departments General Rules on pages 154-155.
2. Exhibitors are limited to two entries in each class unless otherwise specified.
3. Exhibitor does not have to or have been affiliated with FFA, 4-H or any other program to enter categories.
4. All grain and seeds competing for premiums must be exhibited by the producers. **In addition, each exhibitor may be asked to sign a certified statement indicating he is a bona fide producer of the seed he is exhibiting. Seed treated with a material that alters the natural color will be excluded from competition.**
5. Proper containers will be furnished by the State Fair for seeds, loose grain, etc., but at close of Fair, the exhibitor is asked to remove their exhibits from containers and see that all equipment loaned for display is returned to the Superintendent. A release will not be granted until all equipment is checked in.
6. **Judging will be on Wednesday, August 18.**
7. Collections and displays must be made up of specimens other than those entered in single classes.
8. Exhibitors must not change their exhibits after Tuesday, August 17, at Midnight.
9. Clipped oats and barley will be excluded from competition.
10. No article or exhibit can be removed before 6:00 p.m. Sunday, August 29. All exhibits not called for by exhibitor on/or before Monday, August 30th at 12:00 p.m. will be discarded.
11. **All corn entered must be in at least the final stages of maturity. (Grain fully dented down, fully colored, and past the milk and dough stage.)**

12. When, in the judge's opinion, no entry in a class has the quality implied by a First Place designation, he may award such placing as he deems appropriate or he may disqualify the entry.

GRAIN, FIELD SEEDS, PLANTS, CROPS, ETC.

NOTE: The judging of Grain and Field Seeds will be assisted by seed technicians from the University of Kentucky. Any grain or field seed that in their estimation is more than 2 years old can be disqualified from placing.

- Must be pure soft Red winter wheat and not contain any seed treatment coating. No mixture of red and white kernels. They should be large and plump, the same size, shape, and color throughout the wheat to secure uniformity.

- Wheat will be judged on basis of seed quality, uniformity, commercial grade and condition.

DIVISION 2204

HAY

NOTE: Exhibitors may enter up to two entries but will be limited to winning one premium in each class.

All bales entered must be one whole bale minimum two strand securely tied and must weigh at least 45 lbs. Judging will be guided by standards set forth for USDA No. 1 Grade Hay. The following point scale will be applied: Conformation and General Overall Appearance of Bale – 10; Purity of Crop represented – 25; Quality (Curing, Color, Smell) – 25; NIR Forage Analysis – 40.

Any entry that, in the judge's estimation, does not score more than 50 total points will not be eligible for placing.

CROP/SEED ART

Exhibitors may make two entries in this category. Please list double entries on the entry form. A wide variety of seeds used in exhibits is preferred.

Only the following materials may be used:

- Seeds, stems, head or panicles, and fruiting bodies of oats, wheat, barley, rye, corn, soybeans, sunflowers, buckwheat, sudan grass, sorghums, and forage grasses and legumes common to Kentucky. Dried seeds, pods and fruits only of any horticulture crop (vegetable or flower) which is suited to or adapted to Kentucky.
- Materials used may be painted or shown in their natural color.
- Visible plant materials not listed will disqualify the exhibit.

Exhibits may be hanging or standing. Exhibits meant to be hung must be equipped with screw eyes and wire that will support the work. Please indicate type and approximate size of exhibit on entry form.

Maximum dimensions are: 18" high, 24" x 30" in area.
